From the moment we walked through the gate of this originally inconspicuous bungalow, tucked away in a moderately tranquil estate in Lugbe, I was enthralled. Not necessarily by the bright red shirts that the hoard of little children wore but by their gestures. Laughter, enthusiasm, singing! These were not the sort of things one would expect of a place generally regarded as somber. But the little children of Gifted and Talented Homes were genuinely excited to see people, just as they were overwhelmed by the tons of donations that had emerged at their doorstep. Gift, their caregiver, fluttered around the items with a grin as wide as her face. Her joy knew no bounds. She told of how she had never imagined so much. "Sometimes," she said "we are not sure of what we will eat tomorrow." Because food is never really enough for over two dozens of the kids she had chosen to cater for, as a foster mother. "So much food. The children will be eating for weeks to come!"

Gift seemed to know a great detail about each and every single child in the home, from the crawling toddler to the budding teenagers. One by one she would recount the story behind their emergence at the care-home. One little girl, placed just outside her doorstep, was just a few days old when her mother abandoned her. Two boys, brothers, had been brought to the home by their Aunt, who had rescued them during a protracted, deadly crisis in their hometown up North.

Both their parents had been slaughtered, hacked to death right before their tender eyes. The boys had escaped, by a hair's breadth. But their Aunt could not afford to look after them as she earns very little in Abuja where she works and lives. So, Gift's care-home came to mind. Another outstanding story is that of a girl I fondly call "Ella". Ella wants to be "Fashionista" when she grows up. And she looked it. Her beautifully knitted cornrows sat atop her head like a cultural diadem, her hair only very recently made. Ironically, she was to attend her mother's funeral in a few days, and then she would be back to the Orphanage, to which she would be confined - possibly for the rest of her growing years. Ella is only 7.

"I am a gifted child!" The children chimed, every now and then, as each one thumbed at their chests. Their eyes twinkled, their pearly whites shone. It was believable. They sang a song, or two, the voices of little angels. Even the little ones who could barely mutter a word, swung from side to side, in unison. What a sight to behold. Children with the saddest of stories. smiling and singing, with all of their hearts. And then I ask myself, what excuse do I have to be worried, disgruntled or ungrateful? Like many persons that I know, who have been privileged to have lived in homes, amongst loved ones, many who now have homes and are still surrounded by loved ones, we have lofty dreams and ambitions. We want to make money so we can buy big houses, drive expensive cars, establish massive empires, even travel the world. We want to do this, and to do that...and even when we tick the boxes, its not enough.





Our ambitions grow bigger and bigger and so does our dissatisfaction. Soon, we fail to see those priceless little things we already have, things for which we should be grateful for. Things such as constant food supply we have on our table. Things such as good health and even for life. We are not even grateful for the precious moments we get to spend with those we love. With our eyes so far out in "the future" we imagine will bring satisfaction, we fail to enjoy the gift of "the present" until it becomes "a past" we will live to regret.

For many of the children of Gifted and Talented Homes, they will never have the opportunity to enjoy the traditional family, as many of us currently do. Many of them will never get to reunite with their parents, or other loved ones again. While "Mommy Gift" is doing her best to help them have as pleasant a life as each of them can possibly have, we all know that what they have is not a life to be coveted. Children who have learnt to hope for anything and everything one day at a time. After all, school fees, clothes and even food is not guaranteed. They can only pray and wait patiently, that people who have a heart,



On arrival at the school, the team was met by Rev. Sr Scholastica Nworah, the Administrator of the School, who had been previously notified of the visit by the volunteers. Due to the closure of schools occasioned by the COVID-19 pandemic, there were only 3 (of the 16 visually impaired & partially sighted) students at the boarding facilities at the time of the visit.

When the team arrived and proceeded to offload the items for donation to the centre, the Coordinator of the Centre, Rev. Sr Ugochi was left speechless when she saw all the items which the team had donated. In her own words, 'I never expected this', the sight of the ten (10) wheelchairs, which she went on to say was mind centre (which helps to as the rehabilitate kids who were physically challenged and scheduled for corrective surgeries) was in dire need of wheelchairs at the time of the visit. 
